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Educational Pathways in Italy: Emanuel's Perspective-Reflective Essay for the Special Issue: "Community Sponsorship and Complementary Pathways: Global Movements for Resettling Refugees Driven by Local Actors"

Executive Summary

- Using the experience of Emanuel, an Eritrean refugee student, this paper critically examines Italy's University Corridors for Refugees (UNICORE) project.
- UNICORE is one of Europe's more notable educational pathways for refugee students.
- It illustrates both the transformative potential and the structural shortcomings of this project, particularly in its failure to secure long-term legal stability and employment opportunities for graduates.

Key Findings

UNICORE provides transformative access to higher education and community sponsorship support

- UNICORE offers the opportunity for refugees, particularly in African countries, to pursue a master's degree at an Italian university.
- The programme is made possible through the collaboration between universities and refugee support organizations such as Caritas and Diacnoia Valdese.
- **Emmanuel received extensive support after arrival, including basic necessities such as food and toiletries, as well as help with medical appointments and social activities.**
- Despite the challenges of COVID-19 and cultural differences, **the volunteer support networks associated with Caritas enabled Emanuel to navigate his first year and succeed academically.**

Legal uncertainty is the programme's most serious flaw

- Emanuel's legal status was dependent on a short-term travel document organised by the UNHCR and Gandhi Charity.
- Renewal procedures for the travel documents were inconsistent and subject to regional policy differences
- UNICORE refugee students could not return to their countries of origin or first asylum for renewal due to security concerns.
- In the case that renewal was a possibility, application processes were often slow and valid for only one year. This meant that by the time a renewal was issued, it would be time to renew again.
- Despite help from Caritas and UNHCR to secure temporary special protection, **Emanuel struggled with years of instability, resulting in severe stress.**

Labor-market outcomes remain poor, forcing graduates into survival jobs

- Despite earning a master's degree, Emanuel works as a restaurant cleaner.
- This is not an isolated case; **many other UNICORE graduates face limited labor-market access and choose to leave Italy for other European Union (EU) countries.**
- **This reality reflects a clear gap between employers and the UNICORE project.**

Author's Recommendations

- Ensure stability of legal status.
- Create strategies to integrate UNICORE graduates into the labor market.
- Push for recognition of the UNICORE project by the private and public sectors to increase the employability of graduates.
- Ensure a clear path to resettlement for refugee students.

Conclusion

- Emanuel's experience demonstrates that while pathways like UNICORE have transformative potential, **they remain incomplete without clear legal and employment outcomes.**
- **UNICORE provides life-changing access to higher education,** demonstrates exceptional collaboration between different actors such as universities and refugee support organizations, and offers high-quality emotional support through its network of volunteers.
- UNICORE has a significant gap in identifying the students' ultimate destination and post-graduation trajectory, including:
 - Struggles to integrate graduates into the labor market.
 - Unable to provide a stable legal status, which places immense emotional pressure on refugee students and creates a barrier to success.
